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WORK EXPERIENCE:

2005—2008 Ashoka Fellowship. Co-director, The Institute for Redress and Recovery, Santa Clara University, Santa Clara, California. Responsible for initiating a variety of projects in the U.S. and abroad against impunity for human rights violators.

March 2001—2005. Program Manager, The Center for Survivors of Torture, San Jose California. A rehabilitation program for survivors of political torture from all countries. Responsible for administration of the program as well as personally providing psychotherapy to torture survivors.

January 1998—December 2000, Founding Director, Center for Justice and Accountability (CJA), San Francisco, California. A private non-profit legal program to close off the U.S. as a place of refuge for human rights violators from abroad.

1978-1998—Licensed clinical social worker. Private practice in psychotherapy, Berkeley, California. Individual and group work with adults. Closed practice in 1998 to devote full time to anti-impunity work. Practice included psychotherapy with survivors of political torture, and providing psychological evaluations and appearing as expert witness in Immigration courts for political asylum appeals when torture was an issue (from 1990 to 1998).

1986--present. Founded a treatment center for survivors of political torture (Survivors International) in San Francisco area in 1986. President of the board of directors 1986-1998, and member of the clinical treatment team 1990-2000. Board member 1998-2001; currently on Advisory Board. Personally undertook to initiate founding similar agencies in San Diego, and Victoria, British Columbia.

1999-present. Board member, The International Institute for Criminal Investigation. Initially a project of CJA (above), now an independent non-profit formed to train war crimes investigators. Offices in The Hague 2004.

2001-present. Founding board member, Canadian Centre for International Justice. Regional offices in Montreal, Toronto, and Ottawa. An organization responsible for finding and bringing to court human rights violators seeking refuge in Canada.
