They argued before a Federal Circuit panel of Judges Taranto, Dyk, and Bryson. Our Acting President and former Dean of the Law School, Lisa Kloppenberg, released an awe-inspiring book last month entitled, "<u>The Best Beloved Thing is Justice: The Life of Dorothy Wright</u>

<u>Nelson</u>" (Oxford University Press). Yesterday, as part of the Santa Clara Law–Stanford Law Conflict Resolution Workshop, co-hosted by The Santa Clara Law Women & Law Association and Women of Stanford Law, we honored her compelling history of Judge Nelson's contributions to the legal profession, gender equity, and conflict resolution. The hybrid event received widespread praise, serving as a testament to Judge Nelson's illustrious career, Lisa Kloppenberg's beautiful and powerful scholarly work, and the panelists' accomplished professional backgrounds.

We also celebrated the publication of Professor David Sloss' monumental new book, "<u>Tyrants on Twitter: Protecting</u> <u>Democracies from Information Warfare</u>". It offers the first detailed analysis of how Chinese and Russian agents weaponize Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, and YouTube to subvert the liberal international order. The book calls for cooperation among democratic governments to create a new transnational system for regulating social media to protect Western democracies from information warfare.

As we head into the exam period and beyond, let us keep close to our hearts the title of Acting President Kloppenberg's book: the "best beloved thing" is indeed justice! Please keep your spirits high, please treat each other with the utmost professionalism and loving-kindness, and please accept my heartfelt congratulations on your remarkable, collective accomplishments over the past challenging year.
